MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

2015 marked the beginning of some very big changes for the Saskatoon Community Foundation.

We began the process of transitioning from our long-time Executive Director Trevor Forrest to our new ED Carm Michalenko and we also welcomed Administrative Coordinator Elaine Lozinski to the staff.

Trevor Forrest was in the position of Executive Director from June of 2002 and contributed to the foundation in that capacity for over 13 years. We would like to thank Trevor for his contributions and welcome Carm to the position. We realize a change of this magnitude will bring with it a period of adjustment for the Board and staff but we are certain we are up to the challenge.

For the Saskatoon Community Foundation (SCF) to succeed in its role of bringing donors and leaders together to build sustainable bases for local charities, we know that we must engage our community. SCF has been serving donors and the community since 1970, but with each new generation, new priorities arise and new regulations govern way in which we build our community. We reach out in order to build new relationships and strengthen our existing

reputation in the community. Since 2007, the PotashCorp Mayor's Cultural Gala has involved business partners and sponsors in SCF. Participation in the premier fundraiser in Saskatoon has helped many of these businesses to forge new partnerships with charities and to consider their roles in making Saskatoon the best community in which to live.

Random Act of Kindness Day helped us to engage all levels of the community, from younger children to seniors in all walks of life. This free and inclusive day of kindness spread the word that caring does not require great wealth and that philanthropy is available to all. Likewise, Vital Signs is a project that was many years in the making. A snapshot of vital community statistics in 10 areas of focus, the purpose of Vital Signs is to promote discussion and engagement among the public, private and charitable sectors, and among all organizations and individuals who have a stake in bettering our community. Over time, the data in Vital Signs will help to provide focus to the SCF with respect to areas requiring the foundation's attention.

SCF's mandate is to assist donors in creating legacies for the benefit of the community. In 2015, SCF offered community programming to advocate good financial planning,

through the Just in Case seminars presented by volunteer Harold Empey and our Will Power Week Seminars given by local lawyers.

Since inception, the Saskatoon Community Foundation has been building a base of support for local charities that will last forever. As our funds grow, so does our ability to help our community. In 2015, SCF made an unprecedented \$5.225 million in grants, bringing our total grants since 1970 to over \$24 million! The majority of these millions have been granted in recent years, and this will continue to grow in future. Our donors have continued to put their trust in the community foundation's management, with \$4.323 million in gifts received in 2015. It was a challenging year in the financial markets, with our investments earning a return of just over 2%, which brings our 10 year average return to 5.87%.

Thanks to you, the people of Saskatoon, the charities working to improve our quality of life, and the many hundreds of donors who give generously to make Saskatoon the best community in which to live! During this time of change for our Foundation, our community and our country, we look forward to opportunities to connect with you and work toward a bright future!

THE FIRST 2000 DAYS OF LIFE

Every funder of charitable programs faces a similar challenge: the need for funds is always greater than the funds available. Of course, there are many ways to help the community, but how can we know we are making a difference? Community foundations tend to have a broad approach, typically funding many types of work through many different grants.

By granting to support the “early years,” SCF can help ensure healthy development in early childhood and a strong community in the future.

Through consultation with experts and the body of research, it was decided that the best opportunity to make an impact on the quality of life in the community was by making grants to help the youngest citizens of Saskatoon, during the first 2000 days of life. During this period, children learn crucial skills and social patterns that will affect their lives in the years to come. By granting to support the “early years,” SCF can help ensure healthy development in early childhood and a strong community in the future. The Foundation continued to make grants in all of its traditional areas of focus, but in 2015, many of our grants supported the first 2000 days of life. The following pages profile a few of those grants.

SIGNATURE GRANT PROFILE



YMCA SOUTH CHILDCARE

Saskatoon has long been aware of the need for more childcare facilities, and with the recent growth of our community, that need is even more acute in some of the newer areas. By helping the YMCA add a new childcare facility in the southern part of the city, SCF helped both newcomers to the city and to the Stonebridge neighbourhood to connect to services and supports for children. The new childcare will support 50 to 60 families. Our grant helped to create a

well-designed outdoor playground utilizing the latest research into early childhood learning. It will provide a safe environment geared specifically to foster and enhance the opportunities for a child to play alone, with a caregiver, or with other children. Play encompasses many facets of child development. It is physical, intellectual, emotional and societal.

The act of play is a crucial component in the successful growth of the brain, body, and intellect.

It allows the child to explore, test, and expand the limits of the growing body, and promotes social, intellectual, and oral skills. ::

STATION 20 WEST: THE SASKATOON MOTHERS' CENTRE'S BREASTFEEDING PROGRAM

The Mothers' Centre at Station 20 West honours the essential work that women do in our community by giving birth to, caring for and raising our children. This work is usually unpaid and often unrecognized, but it is crucial to the health of our community. The Breastfeeding Program was created to provide support to breastfeeding mothers and to encourage breastfeeding in the greater community, particularly among

First Nations women. First Nations women in our community breastfeed at a rate approximately 20 percent lower than that of the overall community, which represents a health gap for First Nations children. Breast milk provides not only nature's own best nutrition but also vital antibodies that develop the immune system and protect against illness. Breastfeeding also helps to strengthen the bond between mother and baby.

The program engages women in supporting one another through the challenges of breastfeeding. It connects women intergenerationally in a culturally safe environment by involving grandmothers and elders familiar with traditional practices in peer support. Through these supports, the Mothers' Centre is helping to ensure a generation of our children get the best possible start in life. 🌱

NURTURING WITH RHYMES

Rhymes are one of the most basic tools to assist in learning and building memory. Nurturing with Rhymes aims to help children experience positive, respectful nurturing from their parents/caregivers, and to help families with young children feel nurtured, children feel respected and better equipped to handle the day-to-day challenges of parenting. Parents, caregivers and their infants come together to learn rhymes and songs in a setting that will encourage learning, fun and connections.

The program provides gentle but effective skills for the adults. The adults learn how simple rhythms can distract, comfort, calm, teach, entertain and please children. Of course the children are learning along with their parents/caregivers, feeling the adult's love, modelling the actions and storing the language until it's ready to emerge in days, weeks or months. Their vocabulary is being expanded and enriched and their awareness of language is growing as they hop and stop, and zoom to the moon.

"The children benefit not only from the language enrichment but socially and emotionally – listening, chanting, singing, rhyming, talking, imagining and moving." 🌟

AIM EARLY EDUCATION PROGRAM

AIM stands for "Ability in Me," and it is one of the only organizations in our community that addresses the needs of children with Down Syndrome, supporting all as individuals who need to be included and reach their full potential. AIM strives to provide learning strategies that target the skills required for successful life-long inclusion. The AIM Early Education Program is an enriched early-learning program for children between the ages of 2 ½ - 5 years, diagnosed with

Down Syndrome, supporting students in their development of speech, language, sensory processing, social skills, self-help skills and motor skills. Collaboration among parents, speech language pathologists, teachers, music therapists, and occupational therapists enables the program to target a wide range of critical skills for the early years. The programming is individualized, and is designed by the child's team, including valuable input from parents.

"By helping these kids build skills necessary for successful inclusion, AIM connects the children to their community and their peers, building understanding and acceptance in our community." 🌈

READ SASKATOON'S CRISS CROSS APPLESAUCE

This new drop-in 12 week family learning program is held in two high-needs locations, one within a core neighbourhood in Saskatoon and one serving primarily newcomer families, to reach marginalized and isolated children and families not yet linked to support networks. Each session consists of parent/child together time and a parent focussed discussion component.

Through interactive activities, parents and children grow their literacy skills together in a fun, supportive setting.

The families work together to provide a comfortable environment for everyone to enjoy the activities. The program builds literacy skills, helps to prepare for school

success (with tips on how to communicate with your child's first teacher and how to prepare for school), and by developing unique approaches for each group, respectful of culture, learning styles, and issues of speech and language development. By helping children and families develop skills in a fun and interactive environment, READ prepares them for success in life! 🌈

GORDIE HOWE FUND FOR ALZHEIMER'S RESEARCH



In 2015, the Kinsmen Foundation honoured Gordie Howe at its annual Kinsmen Sports Celebrity Dinner. In attendance along with Mr. Howe was Wayne Gretzky, and Gordie's son, Martie Howe. At the dinner, Wayne expressed interest in establishing a fund to raise money in Gordie's name. Marty went further, wanting the fund to remain in Saskatoon, Gordie's home town, and that the fund would be used to benefit the city. It was also decided to dedicate the funds to Alzheimer's research, a condition which has touched the Howe family for many years.

Johnathan Abrametz, a donor to the Saskatoon Community Foundation, was a key player in bringing everyone together for the tribute dinner that night. Based on Johnathan's

personal experience with SCF, knowing that the Foundation is Saskatoon-based and that the money is invested in perpetuity, he felt that SCF was the perfect fit and made the suggestion to the group.

Known as Mr. Hockey, Gordie Howe may be as famous for his personable disposition and his philanthropy as he is for his hockey statistics. He has participated in countless fundraisers throughout his life and his name is affiliated with many charitable programs. The Saskatoon Community Foundation is proud to be the steward of The Gordie Howe Fund for Alzheimer's Research.

The Howe Family's intention is that any local money raised in Gordie Howe's name will be directed to this fund. 🌱

JOHN CROSS 2015 CORNERSTONE OF THE COMMUNITY FUND



The Cornerstone of the Community Award honours citizens whose long service to our community has had a lasting impact on life in Saskatoon.

In 2015, the Saskatoon Community Foundation honoured John Cross for his long commitment to our community. His contributions that have changed the face of our community and of agriculture itself. He served as founding Executive Director of POS Pilot Plant Corporation in Saskatoon. He was a founding partner, and later President, CEO, and Chairman of Saskatoon-based Philom Bios Inc., the creator of the world's first commercial phosphate inoculant.

John has served the community on many boards, including the National Research Council of Canada, the Saskatchewan Research Council, SREDA and Royal University Hospital Foundation. He has also been involved in the Raj Manek

Business Mentorship Program, personally mentoring many local entrepreneurs. John has also been inducted into the SABEX Hall of Fame and awarded the Saskatchewan Order of Merit.

John's contributions to science and business development have changed our province for the better. Even so, his ongoing participation in mentorship and ongoing engagement in building young leaders in business are equally important to his role as a Cornerstone of our Community. Forging connections that lead to success empowers people, makes businesses stronger and creates invaluable opportunities in our community.

HARVEY AND ISOBEL CRAIG FUND

One year, while in the process of updating their wills with their lawyer, Harvey and Isobel Craig expressed their continued desire to find a way to give to their favorite charities, even after they were gone. It was then that their lawyer introduced Harvey and Isobel to the Saskatoon Community Foundation. After learning more about the endowment model and being satisfied of SCF's good reputation in the community, they decided to create the Harvey and Isobel Craig Fund.

Born in Foam Lake, Saskatchewan, Harvey entered the Canadian Navy, serving in WW2. After being discharged from service, he moved to Saskatoon, earned his Biology degree from the University of Saskatchewan and went on to work for 38 years in the research branch of Agriculture Canada.

In 1952, Harvey married Isobel Shaw from Nipawin. A homemaker and devoted mother and friend, Isobel worked for a time with Sears Canada, and was a member of the Order of Royal Purple.

Harvey and Isobel made Saskatoon their home and raised their children in the Nutana Churchill neighborhood.

Curling took up a big part of Harvey's life. He was a member of the Granite Curling Club, serving as president for a time. He was on the Executive Council of the Saskatchewan Curling Association for 13 years, also serving a term as president. While with the Saskatchewan Curling Association, now known as CurlSask, he worked on the History Committee, where he helped with the 1988 publication of Saskatchewan Curling – Heartland Tradition,

the first 90 years of history of the association. CurlSask made Harvey an Honorary Life Member.

Harvey was also privileged to have served on several high profile committees that brought various sporting events to Saskatchewan. He served on the Mayor's Committee as a curling representative for the 1971 Canada Winter Games and he was also the curling representative for the 1974 Saskatchewan Winter Games held in North Battleford. Harvey was a member of the organizing committees that brought the Canadian Mixed Curling Championship to Saskatoon in 1978 and the Labatt Brier in 1989.

When Harvey was not curling, he spent time on the golf course. Harvey was a founding member and past President of the Holiday Park Golf Course. Isobel and Harvey were both members of the Saskatoon Golf and Country Club, where Harvey has been a member for 47 years.

Sadly, after 61 years of marriage, Isobel passed away in September 2013.

Harvey continues to serve his community through his contributions to his Donor Advised Fund with the Saskatoon Community Foundation, which goes on to serve various handpicked charities in the Saskatoon area. Harvey holds true to a philosophy learned early in life from his father: "Bring your talents to the good of the community and leave it in better shape than when you found it." Through the examples both Harvey and Isobel have made in their lives, they have done exactly that. 🌱

SHELLBROOK AND DISTRICT HEALTH SERVICES FOUNDATION AND MANAGED FUND



The Shellbrook and District Health Services Foundation Inc. (SDHSF) is a registered non-profit charitable organization. It was originally formed in 1999 as the Shellbrook & Districts Health Services Project Inc. to raise funds to build a new integrated healthcare facility primarily to serve the needs of residents in a 40 to 50 mile radius. The facility would be home to a new 20 bed Acute Care Hospital, an enclosed ambulance entrance, 6 bed Emergency/Trauma centre, 34 bed Long Term Care centre, as well as 20 offices providing support services for Chiropractor, Massage therapy, Physiotherapy, Addictions Counselling, Social Services, Prenatal Care, Home Care, Public Health, Dietician, mental health and many others.

The tremendous spirit of support shown by SDHSF donors – individuals, families, businesses, corporations, organizations – has made it possible for the Shellbrook and Districts Health Services Project Inc. to raise funds for this facility. The \$26.5 million Parkland Integrated Health Centre at 100 Dr. Jack Spencer Way in Shellbrook opened in June 2013 on time and on budget. The original fundraising board has changed the name to a “Foundation” to reflect our new purpose once the new facility was operational. One mission of SDHSF is to raise and manage

funds to support the Parkland Integrated Health Centre and care of its patients and residents, the other being an advisory board to the Health Region for the operation of this facility.

The Foundation and its volunteer Board of Directors is grateful for every donation, large or small. It recognizes donors on its Donor Wall, located at the main entrance of the Parkland Integrated Health Centre.

SDHSF has partnered with the Saskatoon Community Foundation to access its financial expertise. Through the relationship with SCF, SDHSF has simplified the process for donors wishing to give life insurance, appreciated securities or property, providing significant tax advantages to those making much appreciated gifts to our Foundation. Our Managed Fund is for investment purposes, such that capital and investment returns are available to our Foundation on short notice. The SDHSF Agency Fund is a permanent endowment, from which a portion of the investment income is provided annually to our Foundation. Over time, the Agency Fund will grow, providing long-term financial stability to our annual budget. 🌱

DAVID EDNEY FUND FOR THEATRE

Since I have financial security and no dependents, it is easy for me to donate money to worthy causes. It was not until middle-age, however, that I realized that doing it while I am still alive gives me the pleasure of seeing the results.

In addition to general, unattached support for organizations that work for social betterment, I make some of my donations more specific, to areas which are of interest to me, and particularly to areas which are overlooked by other funding sources and where my contributions can perhaps exert some influence. That is the intent of the David Edney Fund for Theatre with the Saskatoon Community Foundation.

Arts funding generally suffers when money is tight, but I believe strongly that the special insights of creative artists are essential for a healthy society. Since I have participated in drama in various capacities for a good part of my life, and I know something about it, that is the area of the arts that I support most.

My fund aims to assist Saskatoon theatres to put on productions that are outside their ordinary fare, that are unusual in some way and that may be somewhat risky for them. There is certainly a place for commercially successful plays that draw large crowds, but companies should also be able to present substantive works that challenge audiences. It is important that we get to see new Canadian works that help us to understand ourselves and the society we live in, but government grants are directed largely to that repertoire. We should also be able to see how the world is viewed by people in other cultures, people who are different from us, people from other times and other places. Openness to others has always been a Canadian characteristic. Now that others are increasingly seen as a threat, the arts' ability to develop cross-cultural understanding is all the more valuable.

By supporting theatre companies when they embark on those kinds of adventurous projects, I hope that my fund will enrich the cultural life of Saskatoon by opening horizons and fostering diversity. - David Edney 🌱

ROB DUMONT FUND



Dr. Robert Dumont, renowned Building Scientist and Engineer, grew up in Vancouver, BC with his parents, Dr. Hubert Dumont MD and Margaret (Winterburn), and eleven siblings. After graduating from Vancouver College and UBC in Mechanical Engineering, he volunteered for CUSO for two years in Nairobi, Kenya. In 1970 he moved to Saskatoon and received his MSc and PhD at the University of Saskatchewan.

Rob was an early advocate of super insulated high efficiency buildings. He was fortunate to be part of a bright innovative team of building scientists based in Saskatoon, first with the National Research Council and later, the Saskatchewan Research Council. This group set out to demonstrate that high energy, super insulated buildings were not only a viable alternative to conventional construction, but if constructed on a large scale, would assist to reduce the negative affects of carbon causing climate change. Convinced of the importance of this research, Rob and his wife, Philippine, built their own super insulated, highly efficient home on Main Street in Saskatoon. When finished in 1992 it was recognized as the most energy efficient building on this planet – an achievement indeed.

His personal life choices truly reflected his values. He rode a bicycle to work, drove a Toyota Prius before they became as popular as they are today, and was always willing to generously share his expertise. He has been a long time supporter of the Saskatchewan Environmental Society and Development and Peace.

Rob was a charter member of Saskatoon's Energy Management Task Force (EMTF), a group that was formed in reaction to the OPEC oil crisis in the mid 1980s that resulted in alarmingly high energy prices. The EMTF was formed with the backing of the federal government with chapters across Canada. Voluntary members who are committed to energy issues, education, information transfer, and advocacy relating to residential, commercial, industry and community support EMTF's mandate. Rob played a major role supporting and developing initiatives that enabled the Saskatoon EMTF to remain a fully active and vibrant organization. Today the Saskatoon EMTF is the only surviving chapter in Canada.

Following Rob's May 2015 passing, the EMTF held the first Rob Dumont Energy Management Awards on October 15, 2015, at which over 200 friends and colleagues attended. Rob was honoured posthumously with the Lifetime Achievement Award in conjunction with the formation of the Rob Dumont Fund with the Saskatoon Community Foundation, as legacy and recognition of Rob's immense contribution to building science and his passion for saving our planet earth.

Rob's wife, Philippine continues to live in their energy efficient home, dedicating her time to volunteering, traveling, painting and sewing. Their daughter Marie is pursuing her Master's degree at the University of Ottawa. 🌱

HARDY SOULS OF '76 MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

In 2006 the Hardy Souls of '76 held a 30th Class Reunion. A memorial table of photographs was set up to honour nine fondly remembered fellow graduates who had tragically passed away far too young. They include David Allan, Jeff Bradford, Tony Cottrell, Rick Gunter, Jon Lambi, Richard Postlewaite, Laurie Rosvold, Joanne Venne and Doug Volk.

The Reunion was a jubilant event, so many laughs and great memories. Quite a number of our former teachers attended. We left feeling connected again, and understanding that we had certainly been privileged to attend Evan Hardy when we did.

There was a surplus after the reunion, so we decided to raise even more money to establish the Hardy Souls of '76 Memorial Scholarship Fund. We were delighted to find

out later that after our actual graduation in 1976, we'd also had a surplus, which we'd all forgotten about. \$1,567 had been sitting in a School Board account for over 30 years! Of course, we added that to our new fund, which will provide one annual grant to be used to assist the successful applicant in receiving post-secondary education and training. The Class of '76 is the only graduating class of Evan Hardy to provide such a scholarship!

We're so pleased to be part of the Saskatoon Community Foundation. While we appreciate the Saskatoon Public School Board for helping us to collect initial donations, the SCF is a better mechanism for providing scholarships in perpetuity, which is what we wanted to be able to do. Our partnership with SCF will make it much easier to build our fund in the future and eventually provide more substantial scholarships to deserving Evan Hardy graduates. 🌱



ROBERT AND LURA MAE SIDER SOCIAL CAPITAL ACCOUNT

Robert and Lura Mae Sider have always displayed the philanthropic spirit in their lives and since making the decision to retire in Saskatoon, they have generously given in many ways to the city. In 2000, the Siders created the Robert D. and Lura Mae Meeds Sider Fund with the Saskatoon Community Foundation and use the income earned from the Donor Advised Fund to support their favorite charities since then.

Every year, in addition to supporting their fund, Robert and Lura Mae have also used their own money to directly support other charities within Saskatoon. In 2015 they opened a Social Capital Account with SCF to assist in areas

of their giving. SCF can facilitate the transfer of securities, something that many charities cannot offer their donors. Donating securities reduces their capital gains tax allowing more of the gift to "flow through" to the charities of their choice. According to Robert, "It only makes sense to do that when you can."

The Siders enjoy the simplified giving of the Social Capital Account. "The money is well handled, there are no fees and we get to help even more charities." It is one more way the Saskatoon Community Foundation can help families like the Siders achieve their philanthropic goals. 🌱

SASKATCHEWAN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY MANAGED FUND



The Saskatchewan Archaeological Society was interested in growing their investments with expert guidance, to allow it to continue to offer quality programs and services to its community.

Tomasin Playford, Executive Director of the Society, along with David Miller, Treasurer, approached the Saskatoon Community Foundation with this goal in mind.

The vision of the Society is to create and foster a deeper public understanding of archaeology and archaeological information, and encourage public support for the preservation of archaeological resources in Saskatchewan, in Canada, and worldwide. Its goals are to:

- (a) Educate the public about the thousands of years of Saskatchewan's human history and about the discipline of archaeology;

- (b) Promote the conservation of archaeological heritage resources;
- (c) Work in partnership with other parties to the benefit of archaeological heritage; and
- (d) Provide and support the provision of financial and human resources and to assist individuals, groups and organizations to be actively and responsibly involved in heritage research, preservation and education efforts.

Proceeds of the Saskatchewan Archaeological Society Managed Fund will be used to support the work of the society and continue its funding efforts. SAS currently provides funding to its chapters and members through a grant program and offers the Zenon Pohorecky Memorial Bursary to university students in a variety of programs. Most recently, SAS has added the Keith Lewis Memorial Student Presentation Awards for Best Graduate and Best Undergraduate presentations at the Annual Gathering and General Meeting. 🌱

BILOKRELI FAMILY FUND

Bilokreli, who immigrated to Canada from Austria in 1899, and Frances Bilokreli (nee Roebuck), who immigrated to Canada from Pennsylvania in 1908, the sisters were the only girls in a family of nine children.

Growing up in a rural community helped them appreciate hard work, the importance of family and a sense of community. Prairie life wasn't always easy but it instilled a strong work ethic and an appreciation for supporting one another. They embraced small town living and were active participants in school, church and the community. Being the only two girls, they were expected to assist with the operation of the family home and farm and worked hard at supporting their close knit family in all ways. Helen and Eunice attended school in Theodore and upon graduation from high school, the two sisters moved to Saskatoon to pursue business and secretarial programs.

Music and travel were always important ingredients in their lives. Both were accomplished pianists, playing in the Theodore United Church during their younger years and both were members of the church choir. Their love of music continued throughout their lives, attending and

supporting many of the fine and performing arts and cultural events in Saskatoon. Helen and Eunice travelled extensively and their trips took them all over the world. Helen enjoyed a variety of sports and was an avid curler at the Granite Curling Club.

Developing a strong work ethic at an early age, both women were committed employees and successful in their careers. They found time to volunteer for a number of charities and various events. They never, however, forgot their rural Saskatchewan roots, returning to Theodore regularly to help with the preparation of meals for the family harvest and later to provide care for their parents

They also never forgot the importance of helping others, a compassion instilled during their early years growing up in rural Saskatchewan when life brought challenges and hardships. Upon completion of their working careers, Helen and Eunice retired in Saskatoon until their passing. Helen passed away in 2010 and Eunice in 2014.

Helen and Eunice were regular donors to many charities but their strong commitment to health was clear by their continuing support to the University of Saskatchewan for medical research. The Bilokreli Family Fund will be used to support research into Leukemia, children's arthritis, and dementia. 🌱

Milton volunteers and has served on the board for more than 12 years.

"The Patch" is another project Milton helped establish along with the Mayor of Saskatoon. Across from Milton's business, on the corner of Third Ave and Duchess Street, are three acres of property owned by the City of Saskatoon. After tearing down some dilapidated houses, work began to turn the land into a community garden, which is tended by volunteers associated with the Saskatoon Food Bank. This year marked the fifth harvest which produced over 20,000 lbs of produce for the Food Bank.

Milton loves to make people happy, something that is reflected in both his volunteering and his career. He is grateful that his business allows him to mix his passion of photography with volunteering. "Choose a job you love and you'll never work a day in your life." He states that he hasn't worked for a long, long time. "We capture memories and preserve the present for our clients. There's something really special and rewarding in that. Those memories are gifts that will keep on giving for generations."

"Treasure Life" has been Milton's motto for many years. "We all get opportunities to do something in life. We have to seize those opportunities and make them count." VITAL SIGNS

On October 6th, 2015, the Saskatoon Community Foundation released its inaugural Vital Signs report. Vital Signs has existed for several years as a program of Community Foundations of Canada. However, 2015 is the first year the report has been produced for Saskatoon.

The first Vital Signs report drew a great deal of media attention to the Saskatoon Community Foundation. It received unprecedented coverage on television, radio and print media beyond what any other SCF initiative of recent years has received. Almost 100,000 copies of the report were distributed to households in the city via the Star-Phoenix, displayed in racks at coffee shops and libraries, and brought to presentations at schools and businesses.

You may ask, "What is it that SCF wants Saskatoon to DO with Vital Signs?" Vital Signs is a snapshot of the community that looks at 10 areas of focus, such as Safety, Work, Arts and Culture, Education and so on. Like a medical vital signs chart, it gives us the current status of the patient, the pulse, blood pressure and so on. But the chart doesn't do any good unless we have a doctor or nurse to interpret it. Is the blood pressure too high? Does the patient need to change his diet?

In our community, we are all the doctors. We all play a role on deciding how things are going and what needs to be better. Do we need more support for the arts, or should we focus more on feeding hungry kids? Should we focus on feeding hungry kids or making sure they get an education so that they can feed themselves? Can they get that education unless we feed them first? What should we be doing?

In order to answer these questions, we first need to be able to see what is being done and how we are doing. Vital Signs is the beginning of a conversation in our community. It presents the raw data on our community. It is up to all of us to interpret that data. We want to involve many voices in this conversation. We want to hear from people from all parts of the community and all walks of life. We want to add new voices to the chorus. When we produce future Vital Signs reports, we will be able to compare them to see what has improved and what has not. We will be able to make better decisions about how to focus our resources to create real change. 🌱

Your community makes you and you make your community. Through Vital Signs, we can all play a more active role in making Saskatoon the best community in which to live.

YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

SCF wants to connect young people to the spirit of philanthropy, getting them involved at an early age in giving to their community and leading the way for a bright future in the coming generations. YOUTH ENDOWMENT SASKATOON

In order to support its development of Youth in Philanthropy, SCF created a special fund for youth projects. Many donors came together with many gifts in 2002 to create the fund which was then known as the Batting 1000 Endowment for Children and Youth. In 2004, our newly created Youth Advisory Council made its first round of grants from the fund. Since then each year, a new group of youth has come together to learn about charity, set priorities for youth projects, and make grants from the fund. In 2012, the YAC renamed the fund Youth Endowment Saskatoon, creating the anagram, YES! This new name reflects the positive spirit of youth, as well as the YAC's desire to say YES! to requests for support! 🌱



YEAR IN REVIEW

2015 was a challenging year in the financial markets. A losing year for Canadian equities (the S&P/TSX declined by 8.3%) produced a lower than average return for the Saskatoon Community Foundation in 2015. Although Canadian equities represented the second largest weight in our portfolio, strong performance by our foreign equities and modest fixed income returns were able to more than offset this loss.

After investment management fees, we achieved a gain of 2.02% for the year. Our 10-year annualized return now stands at 5.87%.

In 2015, after conducting a thorough review with assistance from an investment advisor, our Investment Committee recommended changes to the target asset mix (benchmark) set out in the SCF investment policy. Our Board approved these changes in December. Under the new policy, we will continue with a balanced approach, investing approximately equally in equities and fixed income/alternative investments. Our Canadian equities weighting will be reduced in favor of greater participation in American and global equities. Finally, part of our fixed income investments will be shifted into real estate and mortgage pooled fund.

These changes will improve diversification, reduce interest rate risk, protect against inflation and produce a modest improvement in the portfolio's long-term annualized returns.

Despite these challenges, 2015 was a strong year in terms of donations, with SCF receiving \$4.323 million in gifts from donors. As well, thanks to ongoing community partnerships, 2015 was another record year for grants, with \$5.225 million in grants, surpassing the previous record of \$5 million in 2014!

Our total grants since inception are over \$24 million. Over 85% of that total has been granted in the last ten years. Our assets now total over \$63 million which is an increase of over 400% in the last ten years.

Operating expenditures totaled \$835,281. The operation of the Foundation involves building endowments, as well as comprehensive activities related to strategic grant making and community leadership. Endowment building often involves working with donors and prospects over time before eventually receiving gifts from them. This means that we incur costs now for gifts we may receive in the future. In the view of management, fees of 1.5% are within an acceptable range compared with benchmarks established throughout the community foundation movement. SCF always strives to keep its fees low, honouring its mandate to use its income to support the community, as well as fostering the growth of community leadership. ::

YEAR IN REVIEW

STRONG PARTNERSHIPS IN STEWARDSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

SCF's responsibility as the manager and steward of many different donor funds is something we take very seriously. We recognize that each donation, no matter the size, reflects trust in our ability to invest wisely and use the investment earnings to improve our community in accordance with our donors' wishes.

The management of our investment portfolio is accomplished through an active partnership between our Board of Directors, our Investment Committee and the professionals of Greystone Managed Investments. The Board of Directors provides guidance and oversight to the entire process, with expert advice on policy from the Investment Committee. The Investment Committee also works closely with the staff of Greystone Managed Investments to invest our assets according to policy, establish performance benchmarks and monitor the performance of our portfolio.

OUR INVESTMENT PHILOSOPHY REFLECTS THE FOLLOWING OBJECTIVES:

- ◆ Protect the capital of the fund
- ◆ Maintain a reserve for future declines in the market
- ◆ Achieve the granting objectives of the Foundation
- ◆ Recover the costs of managing and administering funds and providing donors with a wide array of philanthropic services
- ◆ Use an investment style that focuses on long term sustainability

SCF works diligently to keep its investment policy effective and up to date with market trends, which is why SCF has consistently exceeded market average. Our investments provided a 2.02% return for 2015, which brings our 10 year average to 5.87% per year. We are proud of the fact that among the approximately 193 community foundations in Canada, your local foundation has provided very competitive returns over the past decade.

In fulfilling our fiduciary responsibilities, our goal is to obtain competitive total returns over the long term. This is accomplished through a strategic allocation of fixed assets among equities and fixed income securities. ::

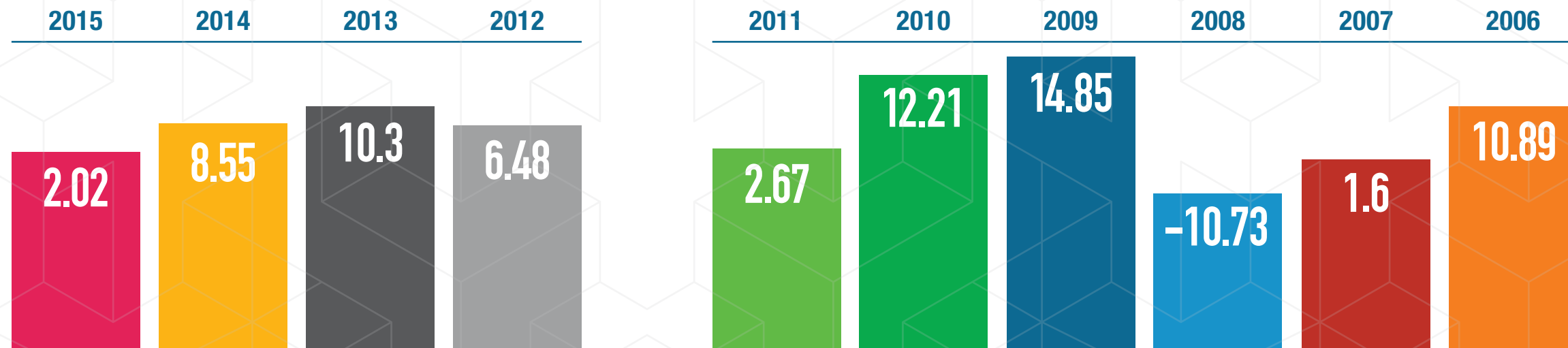

CONNECTING YOUR GIFTS TO YOUR GOALS

We can help you make the right connections.

When you decide to establish an endowment fund with the Saskatoon Community Foundation, you are making a lasting commitment to the community. You can make gifts of cash, a designation in your will, a life insurance policy, real estate, or a gift of appreciated publicly traded securities. These gifts to the Foundation are invested in perpetuity with the income granted to charitable organizations. This means your original gift will make an impact in the community today, tomorrow, and forever.

TYPES OF FUNDS

Unrestricted Funds provide the Foundation with the most flexibility in responding to grant applications. This type of fund is not tied to any specific agency or field of interest, which allows the Foundation to address pressing, changing needs of the community.

Field of Interest Funds are established by donors who wish to support a specific charitable field of interest, such as arts, education, health, family and community, or the environment. Based on the donor's field of interest, the Foundation selects appropriate projects to support.

Donor Designated Funds are established by donors to support one or more specific charitable organizations in perpetuity.

Donor Advised Funds enable donors to be actively involved each year in recommending recipient charities.

Student Awards are established in the name of a donor, or in honour of someone else, to help individuals receive education or training they might not otherwise be able to access.

Saskatoon Community Foundation is a charity itself with ongoing expenses. Contributors to the **Administrative Endowment** recognize the importance of building the Foundations' capacity to lead and serve the community.

Agency Endowments are funds established by charities to generate annual income for their use.

Managed Funds are also established by charities, but are not endowed. The funds can be withdrawn at any time, but benefit from being part of the larger pool of investments.

Community Builders are donors who make deferred gifts—a life insurance policy, a charitable trust, or a bequest by will. Although the gift is deferred, tax benefits can be immediate.

Flow Through Funds are not endowed. Donors may flow funds through the Foundation to the cause of their choice following Canada Revenue Agency regulations. We award flow through grants on behalf of individuals, families, or businesses.

The Saskatoon Fund, home to our memorial, tribute and Century Club donations, is one of the many funds that make up our Unrestricted Fund. Memorial and tribute gifts allow friends and family to donate in memory or in honour of a loved one. Century Club is the club for "everyday philanthropists." Launched by Ross Pinder in 1982 to recognize Saskatoon's 100th birthday, Century Club members commit to donate at least \$100 a year.
