

FROM THE GALA CO-CHAIRS

Two years ago, the Nutrien Saskatoon Community Foundation Cultural Gala began building the Community Fund for Reconciliation—and we honoured the element of water through art, song, and dance. We heard directly from Residential School Survivors, beginning a path of Reconciliation through the experience of the gala. Last year, we reignited the fire, and were reminded that Reconciliation requires constant effort, vigilance and action to create change in our communities.

In 2019, we presented Earth Song.

Mother Earth sustains us with water, nourishment, and an ecosystem rich in resources for all creatures to sustain one another. The diversity in nature allows all of us not only to survive, but to thrive.

The diversity in our communities also makes us better, stronger. The diverse audience in attendance has planted seeds for the work of Reconciliation to continue: changing our community through projects that build partnerships among Indigenous and non-Indigenous people. We were honoured by the presence of elders and survivors of residential schools and the sixties scoop, and inspired by the young leaders such as Emcees Neal Kewistep and Stephanie Clovechok.

The evening's performances also reflected the diversity of the community. The artists and producers created unique performances that resonated with the power of Mother Earth, inspired by her capacity to feed our communities—in body, mind and spirit. A centrepiece of the performance was the shawl dance—an Indigenous prayer to the Creator that we were

honoured to share with all those who attended. Beautiful, bright shawls with elaborate beadwork and fringes brought to life the movements of the performers. And as a special feature, we auctioned 6 shawls created exclusively as a celebration of Earth Song.

Through Earth Song, we honour the past. We look to the future. We share our commitments to engage in

GROW THE COMMUNITY FUND FOR RECONCILIATION

The Community Fund for Reconciliation

This year Saskatoon Community Foundation made its second round of grants from the Community Fund for Reconciliation, and also heard about the results from the first grants made in 2018. The 2018 grants created new partnerships among groups and organizations in Saskatoon, planting seeds in our fertile community that can bear fruit over time. Traditional knowledge about plants and healing practices was preserved by Gabriel Dumont Institute and Friends of Batoche. Hundreds of school-age children experienced Indigenous culture through the Indigenous Ensemble of Saskatoon. Thousands walked together in the Rock Your Roots Walk for Reconciliation.

In 2019, new ground was broken. Whitecap Dakota First Nation partnered with Nutrien to present the first conference on economic reconciliation. READ Saskatoon partnered with nêhiyawak Language Experience to provide an immersion in Indigenous language and culture. Canadian Roots Exchange partnered with Saskatoon Open Door Society to create discussion guides for newcomers with limited English, so that they can better understand the history and treaty relationships that define our nation.

This journey has begun thanks to your generosity, and you can help us take our next steps forward by giving. 

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CONNECTED TO THE EARTH



The 2019 Nutrien Saskatoon Community Foundation Cultural Gala continued its exploration of the four elements to bring you Earth Song, in which song, dance and poetry were used to explore the significance and meaning of the land to Indigenous and non-Indigenous cultures.

In the true spirit of reconciliation, the evening's artists explored the synergies that encourage us to live with Mother Earth in a good way. The very classical sounds of opera from Little Opera On the Prairie gained a unique resonance when paired with flamenco dance by Duendecillo, whose unbridled power and passion is meant to connect us with our hearts. We heard haunting and beautiful fiddle sounds and music from Karrnnel, bringing to life the poetry of Louise Halfe/Sky Dancer. As we listened to prairie song bird Andrea Menard, "Mother Song" honoured the feminine power behind the evening's theme while aerial artist Yuki Block gracefully swayed in the sky.

We heard an original voice from hip hop artist Eekwol, whose music comes from her land and within. Her music offered a unique platform to showcase Indigenous shawl dancers Kimowan Kisik Ahenakew/Raining Sky and Kakishew Watcewkamik Ahenakew/Body of Love, along with traditional dancer Sekwum Achak Ahenakew/Spring Spirit.

We share with you an excerpt of a poem by Louise Halfe:

My ancestors, nohkom and nimsom are more than a hundred and fifty years old.
They are as old as Creation itself.
Their sinew holds the ridges of the mountains their skeletons are the backbones of this country.
Their voices are as old as the Thunder clapping the earth with the heartbeat of the drum.

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





The shawls feature intricate beadwork and detailed embroidery with symbols representing different Indigenous communities throughout Saskatchewan. Wearable artworks, the shawls can be hung, carried or worn and are a unique opportunity to celebrate the meaning and memory of Earth Song. The commission was sponsored by Commercial Sandblasting and Painting, with each shawl being purchased by guests of the evening.


