
On May 10, 2013, donors and grant recipients were invited to Prairieland for *Salute!*, a celebration of the 2013 Quality of Life grants. Quality of Life Grants is the Saskatoon Community Foundation's core unrestricted granting program. This program grants more funds to Saskatoon charities than any other granting program at SCF. Our unrestricted funds come from gifts from literally thousands of donors over the years, all of whom made the decision to allow SCF discretion to grant the funds where they can make the greatest impact on our city's quality of life.

Sponsored once again by SaskEnergy, *Salute!* pays tribute to the Saskatoon charities, as well as their staff and volunteers, who in 2013 will carry forward the mission of the Saskatoon Community Foundation by providing programs and services that improve the quality of life in Saskatoon. *Salute!* is also a tribute to the many donors over our 43 year history who gave generously to ensure that local charities would be supported in making Saskatoon the best community in which to live.

Each year, our Grants Committee, made up of members of our Board of Directors and other knowledgeable and engaged people from our community, reviews as many as 100 LOIs (Letters of Intent to Apply) in our six focus areas: Arts and Culture, Education, Health, Social Development, Environment and Capacity Building. From this large set of LOIs, the Grants Committee selects projects it would like to consider funding and requests full applications. The applications are then reviewed and granting decisions are made and approved by our Board of Directors.

In 2013, Quality of Life were awarded to 32 organizations. From this wide pool of worthy programs, we invited 3 organizations to tell us about the impact their grants would make on people in Saskatoon. Jo-Anne Dillon, President of Saskatoon Opera, explained how bringing Mozart to schools would expose over 6000 local schoolchildren to this amazing art form. Adrienne Begg from Agriculture in the Classroom told us about the Little Green Thumbs Program, which will involve 300 students and teachers from three schools, learning about plant growth, food production, healthy eating and environmental stewardship. Barb Macpherson, Executive Director of the YWCA, spoke about the over 700 women and children who will learn about making healthy choices for a better life at the YWCA emergency shelter.

Saskatoon Opera – Mozart’s Magic Flute in Schools

Saskatoon Opera’s Youth and Education Program offers Saskatoon children an opportunity to enjoy opera’s glorious music and theatrical storytelling that speaks to all cultures. Saskatoon Opera especially wants to offer the Youth and Education program to community schools. Many families in these schools are new to Saskatoon, do not speak English, or have not had the opportunity to be involved in the arts. Music is a universal language and speaks to all ages, races, income levels and backgrounds. Opera has many different areas of interest in which children could aspire to be involved, including set construction and painting, costume design, makeup artists, musicians, singers, producers and directors. The aim of the program is to inspire a new generation of children to be involved in the arts by exposing them to this wonderful traditional art form.

Agriculture in the Classroom - Little Green Thumbs

The Little Green Thumbs project, managed by Agriculture in the Classroom, helps young people value the health of themselves, the environment and their community through active participation in a classroom garden. Indoor gardens are living classrooms that make learning concepts such as nutrition, environmental stewardship, sustainable food systems, and community interdependence fun and relevant. In today’s world of high tech gadgets and modern conveniences, the connection to food, land and the environment is getting lost. While young people can operate a computer with ease, they may have no idea where their food comes from. The youth of today will face the challenge of building a sustainable future through responsible social, environmental and economic decisions. As environmental challenges are addressed in education, it is important that solutions are presented in a positive manner. School gardening is a powerful tool to engage students in learning and caring about the environment. Little Green Thumbs helps our young people to make conscious, healthy decisions regarding their nutrition, the environment, the community they live in and their future. The garden engages students by providing a dynamic environment to observe, discover, experiment, nurture and learn.

YWCA – Nutrition Coaching for Women and Families

The YWCA serves vulnerable women and children through its crisis shelter. Daily, staff sees women struggling with proper nutrition and basic skills required to cook. Often this results in poor diet and subsequently a poor performance of daily tasks. Mothers both crave and need knowledge about proper nutrition requirements for their babies and young children, while also coping with time and budget constraints. Learning a proper diet will improve the emotional, behavioural, and physical wellbeing of these women and children.

In the crisis shelter, the YWCA provides wholesome food ingredients and requires women to cook for themselves. While some women are very comfortable in the kitchen, many others have not had the opportunity to learn from family members, or other teachers. They may get by day-to-day eating toast and cereal. Collective kitchens provide opportunities to learn about food and to cook in a social atmosphere. Youth residents will also benefit from nutrition coaching, learning the skills required to eat properly, to buy food within a budget, and to cook and bake from scratch. Since these youth may not have had the opportunity to learn how to cook from their mothers and fathers, they can also benefit from the program, and bring these skills forward in their lives and in our community.

2013 Quality of Life Grants

From the arts to milk for hungry kids, our Quality of Life grants support causes in six areas of focus designed to address the overall needs of our community. Drawn from income from unrestricted funds and donations from the last 43 years, these grants represent our donors' confidence that the Saskatoon Community Foundation can identify the areas of greatest need in our community, and provide the greatest impact for their donations.

Go Big & Come Home


The 7th Annual PotashCorp Mayor's Cultural gala will be held on September 21, 2013 at TCU Place.

Jim Underhill Memorial Golf Tournament



Jim Underhill was an extraordinary man who lived well, and approached each endeavour with the same passion that made him a successful surgeon. When an airplane crash ended his life in 2009, our community lost not only a surgeon, but a man of great compassion, caring and generous spirit.

As a surgeon, his skills improved the lives of hundreds of residents of Saskatoon, but most who encountered him are quick to point out that his caring and compassion were more important features of his approach to his work. He was an avid skier, sailor, motorcyclist, and pilot. He lived each day to the very fullest. He was known for his sense of humour and his generosity of spirit. When Jim passed away, his family, business colleagues and friends worked together to establish the Dr. Jim Underhill Fund at the Saskatoon Community Foundation in his memory, providing a lasting legacy of the contributions Jim made to his community, and the love he shared with family and friends.

On June 3, 2013, Dr. Underhill's friends and family hosted the fourth annual Jim Underhill Memorial Golf Tournament at Riverside Golf and Country Club, this year raising over \$40,000 thanks to the generous support of family, friends, and business sponsors. The total amount raised over the four years of the tournament is now close to \$300,000. Jim's family decides each year what the annual grant from the fund will support. The grant for 2013 has gone to support eye care at the Saskatoon City Hospital. Thanks to all of the friends and supporters who helped to make this special day last forever, joining in Dr. Underhill's legacy of generosity and support for our community!

2013 Strategic Alliance Award

The Strategic Alliance Award recognizes a business that has partnered with a charity over a period of time to address an identifiable need in our community. SCF established the Strategic Alliance Award to increase awareness of the value of strategic partnerships and to recognize the commitment of organizations to improving our community. The charity partner of the recipient receives a \$5000.00 unrestricted grant. To be eligible for the award, businesses must be private sector, for-profit enterprises based in Saskatoon. The business must have established an ongoing partnership with a charity for a minimum of two years. Partnerships should be collaborative in nature and extend beyond donated dollars. They must have a successful track record, benefit our community and be beneficial for both the charity and the business partner.

In 2013, the recipient of the Strategic Alliance Award was announced at the Celebrate Success Gala on May 9th. The Saskatoon community Foundation would like to congratulate Joan Cochrane and The Medicine Shoppe Pharmacy Inc. for its longstanding partnership with the Saskatoon Council on Aging. The Medicine Shoppe plays a key role in planning and executing Spotlight on Seniors, a key Saskatoon Council on Aging event, helping SCOA achieve its goals of supporting seniors in our community, while also forging relationships that benefit the business and the seniors themselves. In addition to sponsoring the event, the Medicine Shoppe provides assistance with organizing, promotion and execution of the event. A five-year commitment by the Medicine Shoppe shows that the company is committed to serving the community.
